#### What is StreetSafe?

As part of the government's agenda to tackle violence against women and girls, we are using an online tool called StreetSafe to enable people, particularly women and girls, to report locations where they feel or have felt unsafe and to identify the features on why that location made them feel unsafe. The focus of this is to identify particular areas and factors that lead to people feeling unsafe and might help offenders either commit or conceal a crime – such as street lighting, abandoned buildings or poorly designed spaces, vandalism, as well as behaviours of individuals or groups of people. Speedwatch - St. Margaret's

Dover Community Safety Unit officers have been conducting high-visibility mobile speed patrol checks in the village. Most recently, Monday 27 October. PCSO Mark Ball was in the High Street area between 0940 and 1030 hours. PCSO Ball observed and recorded a total of 121 passing vehicles entering the village. Twenty-two of those being driven in excess of the speed limit. This equates to approximately 18% of all vehicles entering the area within the hour timeframe.

Kent Police is dedicated to ensuring St. Margarets-at-Cliffe continues to be a safe place to live, work and visit.

### **Crimes of note**


### Anti-social behaviour (ASB)

Kent Police have seen a continued rise in criminal use of catapults. Calls received relate to the use of catapults to cause criminal damage and harm to wildlife. It is not currently illegal to possess a catapult but if our officers suspect one is being used to commit crime or antisocial behaviour then they will not hesitate to seize and destroy it along with any other items such as ball bearings. They will also make arrests and bring offenders to court if necessary and proportionate.

# Catapults - Know the law

Catapults can be classed as offensive weapons.

If you carry one in public without a reasonable excuse, you could face up to four years in prison.



If you use it to threaten or injure someone, or damage property, the penalties could be even higher.



#### Fraud

With fraud responsible for nearly half of all reported crime and numerous ways to try and scam you, it remains invaluable to protect yourself.

We have had a spike in this area for courier fraud:

You receive an unexpected telephone call. A scammer claims to be from your bank or a police officer. They tell you either that:

- a fraudulent payment has been spotted on your card that needs sorting out
- someone has been arrested using your details and cards

Scammers may keep your phone line open so a "call back" goes to them. They'll ask for your PIN or send someone to collect your card — no real bank will do this.

### Other tricks:

- Pretending to be police or bank staff investigating fraud to get your cash.
- Asking you to buy an item for "evidence" then stealing it.
- Telling you to move money to a "safe account" it's theirs.

Never share your PIN, card, or transfer money to a 'safe' account.

### Witnesses sought after serious collision in St Margaret's at Cliffe

A motorcyclist has suffered life-threatening injuries following a collision with a car in St. Margaret's at Cliffe. Kent Police officers were called to Dover Road between Pond Lane and the junction for Station Road and High Street at 2.50pm on Saturday 4 October 2025.

The motorcyclist, a man in his 40s, was riding an orange Honda bike towards the junction when he was involved in a collision with a grey Citroen C4 travelling in the opposite direction.

He was taken to a London hospital where he remains in a critical condition.

No other injuries were reported.

Electric Scooters - know the law

Although e-scooters can be great fun, it is <u>against the law</u> to ride one on a public road, cycle lane or pavement. Please share this information with friends and family.

E-scooters are classed as Personal Light Electric Vehicles (PLEVs), which means they are treated as motor vehicles and subject to the same legal requirements, such as driving licence, insurance, number plates, lighting, road tax, crash helmets etc. **Without these, e-scooters cannot be used legally on the road.** 

The Government is currently trialling the use of approved rental e-scooters as environmentally friendly modes of transport in specific locations in the UK.

For the rest of the country, under current law, e-scooters can only be used on private land with the landowner's permission.

It is our priority to keep you and other road users safe.

We are obliged to take action against anyone who is caught repeatedly using an e-scooter illegally or in a way that causes a nuisance to others. In these circumstances we have the power to seize the e-scooter under Section 59 of the Police Reform Act/165 of the Road Traffic Act – and we'd really prefer not to.
